GRANT 25 YEAR FRANCHISE TO INTERSTATE CO.

Same Company Given A 5-Year Street Lighting Contract At A Reduced Rate.

The City Council have had two special meetings the past week, one on Tuesday evening and one on Wednesday evening. At the meetings the question of the franchise of the Interstate Power company was taken up and it was extended for twenty-five years.

In the matter of street lighting In the new contract the city will save on their stret lights the sum of \$96.40 per month. In this contract the power rate and the domestic rate is also reduced one cent per killowatt, which will mean quite a saving to the consumers of current in the city.
