



Brig. Gen. Gilmore Is Executive of San Francisco Fair





These giant hoops are part of the power conduit of the \$7,500,000 Platte valley development being undertaken by the Public Works administration. The huge power tunnel will be suspended in these circular steel girders. The project will include a 25,000 KVA hydro-electric plant, 220 miles of transmission lines, two reservoirs and 75 miles of canals for irrigation of arid Nebraska lands.
