MORE WRIST COCK-SMOOTHER SWINGING

N THE larger illustration above Bobby Jones has reached the extent of his upstroke and body turn. At this point Jones' oack is presented to the hole, his left hip is well around to the right and his wrists are cocked in the manner so typical of many others of the golfing greats. Jones, however, does not stop his wrist cock at this point. By allowing the fingers of his left hand to relax a trifle, the clubhead dips below the horizontal and gives a greater measure of cock to the wrists. This not only gives him the chance to put more power into the final speeding up of the clubhead life.
