The purchase of a burglary and robbery insurance policy, at a cost of \$589 for \$210,000 of the 17 milions dollars of securities he holds in the state treasury has been announced by State Treasurer Walter H. The policy covers robberies of messengers transporting the securities, as well as robberies from the vaults.
