#### HOLT COUNTY STOCK RAISERS VACCINATE AGAINST ANTHRAX

Quarrentine In Adjacent Counties Starts Rumors of Losses Here Which Can't Be Verified.

Anthrax has broken out in north central Nebraska to such an extent that Boyd, Knox and Cedar counties are now quarrantined. This means that no cattle, hogs, sheep or horses may be removed from these counties. While some cases have been reported in Holt county, the county is not quarrintined at present but the infested areas are under close supervision.

Reports have been current on the streets the past week that farmers in various parts of the county are losing cattle from Anthrax. We found that people who have been reported as losing cattle by anthrax have lost none from that disease. Quite a few head of cattle and some horses in various parts of the county were killed last week by the severe electrical storms that visited the county on two different For 4-H Club Meeting days, but none have died from anthrax that we have been able to discover.

Dr. Bennett was out in the country this morning and he said that he was convinced that there was hardly any anthrax in the county.
