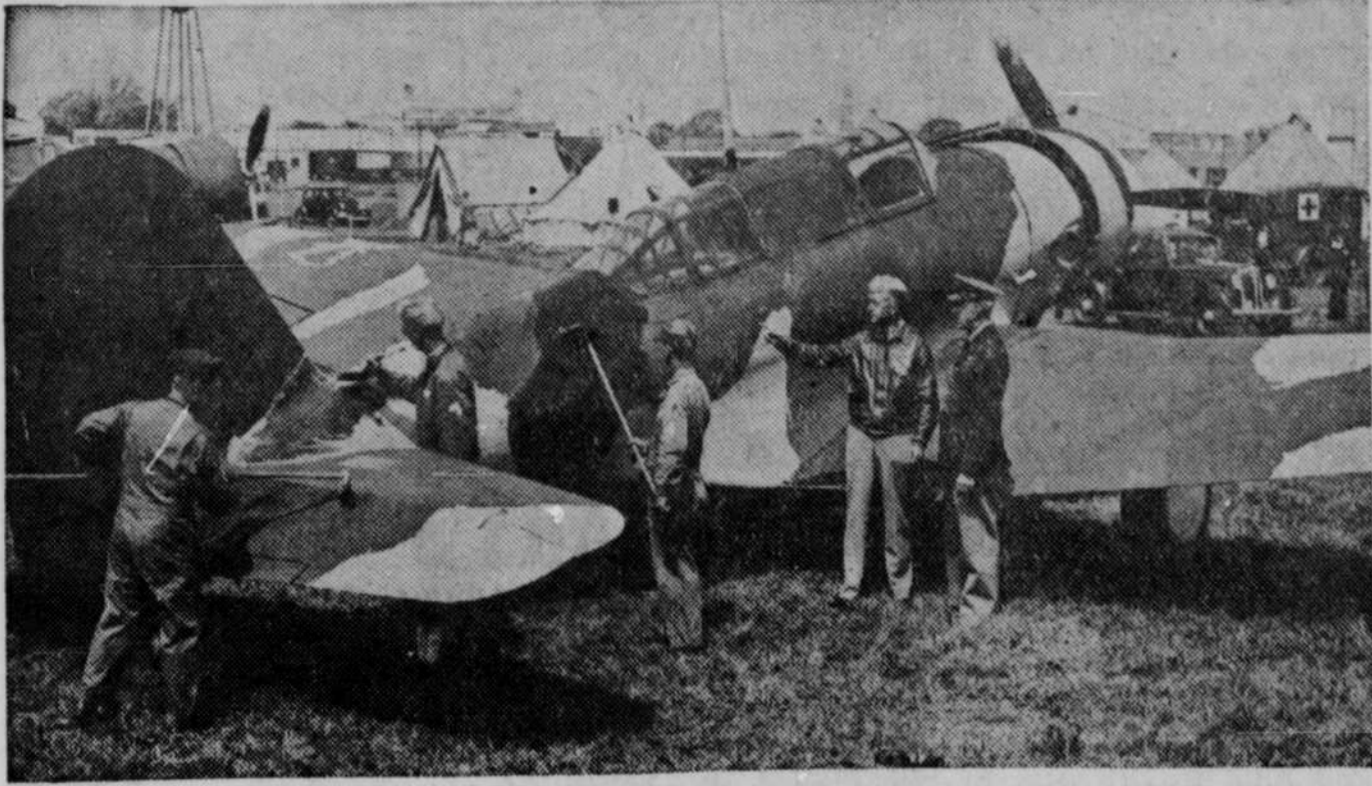


New Camouflage Makes Planes Invisible



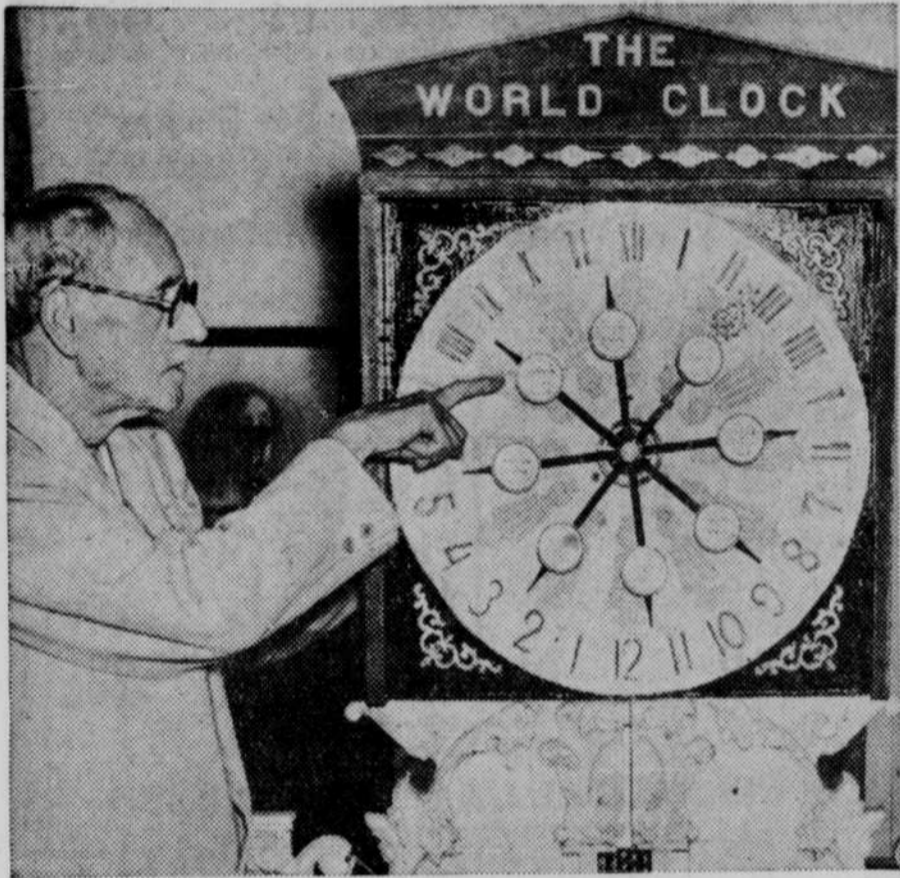

Big "Applesauce" of 1960



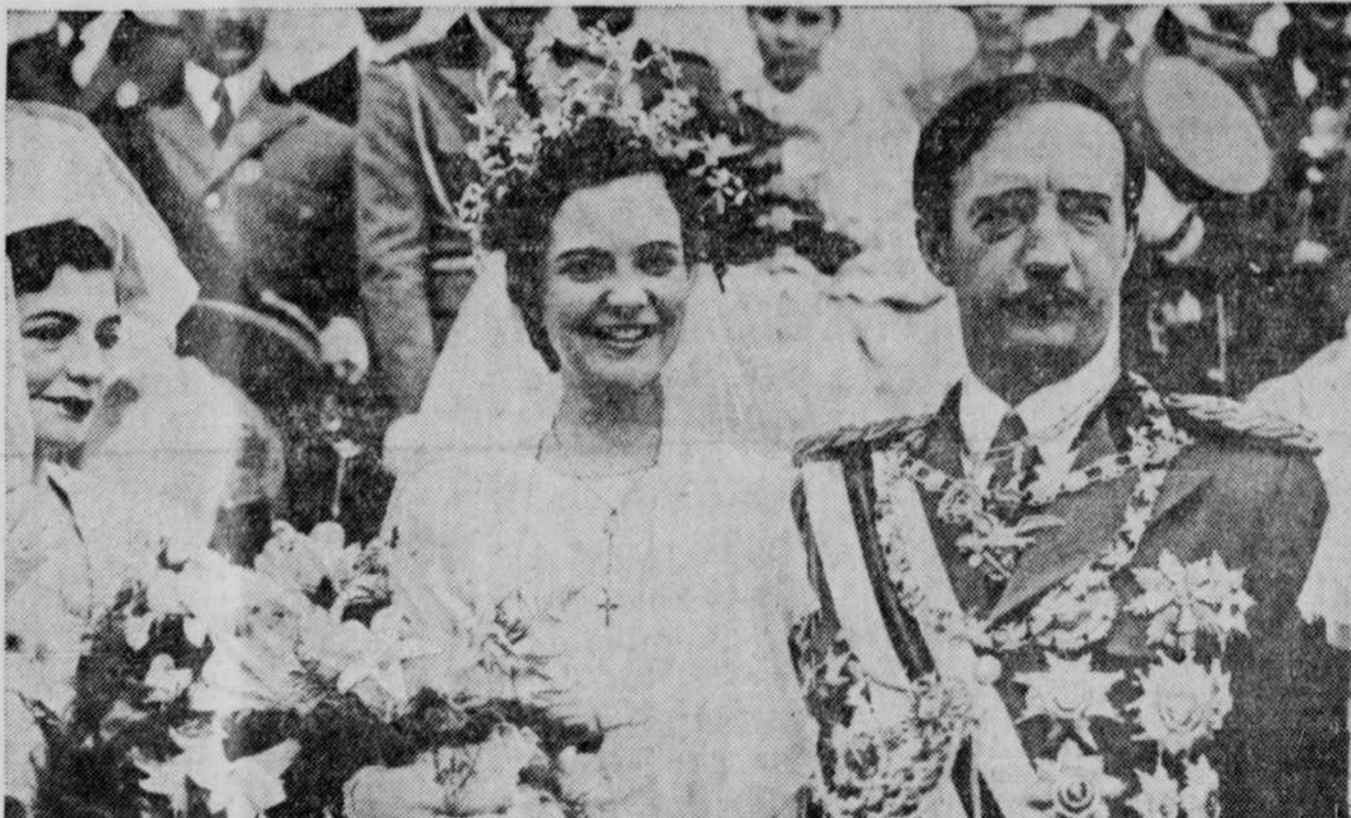
