Motion by Miles, Seconded by McNally, that Uhl be appointed as Chairman of the Council. Carried.
Motion by Miles, seconded by Uhl, that the water rates be reduced for the second and third quarters of 1939 for residential properties to a minimum of \$3.00 for the first 10,000, and ten cents (10c) a 1,000 thereafter. Motion carried.
Motion by Uhl, Seconded by Yantzi, that the date of hearing on the Alcohol liquor licenses of Richard L. Tomlinson and W. M. Gatz be set as of May 8, 1939, at 7 p. m. Motion carried.

Motion by Uhl, Seconded by Phalin, that the Council decline the revision of the City Ordinances, as offered by Paul Haberlin. Motion carried.
