Reimers last May, so after five months the electors of the Fourth district are again represented on the county board.

The appointee, William E. Wulf, is 62 years of age and has been a resident of this county since 1879, sixty years. He came to this county when a little tot of two and has ever since been a resident of the county, living in the extreme southeast corner,1 mile west of the Antelope county line and one mile north of the Wheeler county line. The Weather


