"It is important that this Relief Program go over real quickly if we are to accomplish what we have set out to do. While the American Red Cross has undertaken to furnish medicines and some clothing, it will be up to the charity of the people of other countries as well as our own to furnish the other necessities of life. Surely no people can be accused of being unneutral because of their willingness to assist in caring for the wounded and the women and children suffering the result of invasion and the bombing of cities and homes without any declaration of war, and this by a country whose resources, both in man and money and the things that go to constitute an army, are twenty times greater than the whole population of Finland.
