Members of Local Production Ass'n Can Obtain Loans on Stored Grain

Farmer-members of the O'Neill Production Credit Association can now obtain loans from the association on wheat, rye, and barley stored under the AAA farm program, it was announced by D. C. Schaffer, Holt County rancher, who is president of the association.

Mr. Schaffer said the association is making such loans available to its members as a means of broadening its service to farmers and livestock men throughout Boyd, Holt, Wheeler and Garfield counties.

Since the Commodity Credit Corporation has the responsibility for inspecting the commodity offered

as security, the Production Credit association will not charge any service fee for handling loans of this type and no additional purchase of association stock will be required, the association president explained.
