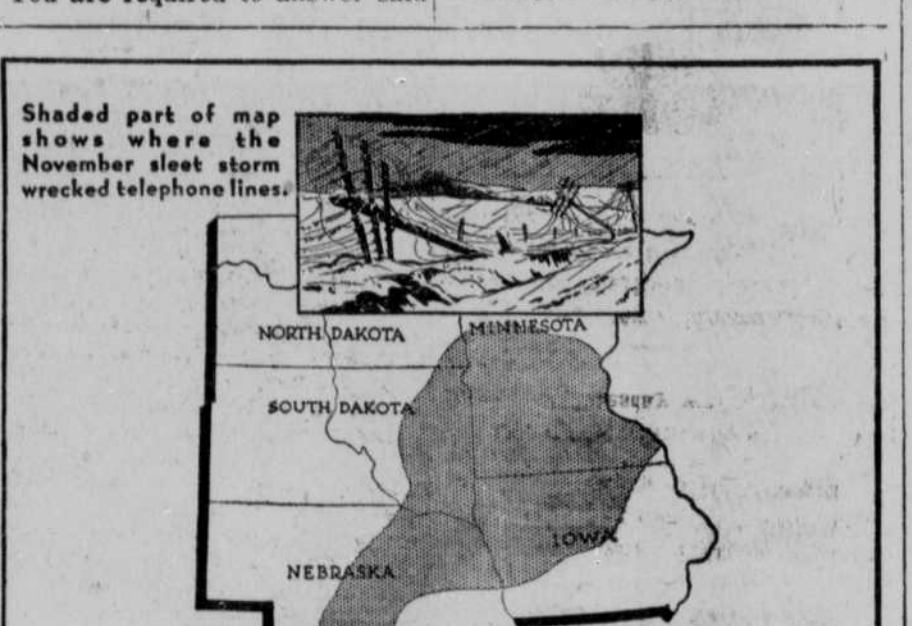

When the Storm Struck On Sunday afternoon, the 10th of November, a drizzling rain which had been falling in midwestern Nebraska began to freeze and form ice on the telephone wires. About the same time, other sleet storms had developed in parts of Iowa, Minnesota and South Dakota and in some places there also was heavy snow. The weight of the ice on the telephone wires, coupled with falling temperatures and a strong wind, caused many telephone lines to break, cutting off about 200 cities and towns from telephone communication. The telephone property loss of these companies was nearly \$200,000.
