


Seen From the U. S. Atlantic Patrol

Speaker Rayburn Signs War-Zone Act

The bill passed by a vote of 212 to 194, after one of the fiercest undercurrent battles for votes ever waged in congress. Those who were for and against the bill got together at the signing. Ambassador Meets Yanks in Britain





Biggest Naval Bomber Launched



The world's largest flying boat, the navy's new 67-ton four-engine patrol bomber, slipped down the ways at the Glenn L. Martin plane plant at Baltimore, Md., in colorful ceremonies heretofore reserved for surface vessels. The ship is capable of carrying a bomb load to Europe and return, non-stop. Mrs. Artemus L. Gates, wife of the assistant secretary of the navy for air, was sponsor of the ship which was christened "Mars." Many notable personages, including Rear Admiral John H. Towers, chief, Bureau of Aeronautics, U. S. navy, were present at the ceremony. Photo shows the huge aerial battleship after the launching.

Old Man River Again




