It is not a diploma in any sense of the word and must no be used as credential to secure paid employment as a nurse nurse's aide or hospital attendant The Chapter and instructors are especially charged with the re-sponsibility of making the students understand that the purpose of the Red Cross Home Nursing course is to insure safer and more healthful homes and not to provide vocational training.

If a sufficient number of women in and around O'Neill are interested in taking the course, classes will be established here in the near future. Enrollment in each class is limited to 20.
