"While OPA suggests that the applications be filled out prompt-ly upon receipt," McKeough said, "the public is urged not to mail them until June 1. By that date the post offices will have mail channels cleared for fast handling and OPA mail centers will be geared up to process the cards and mail out the books.

Cards mailed in advance of June 1 will not be processed at least until that date and, since mechanical arrangements will not

have been completed, books mailed prior to June 1 may be lost
