The following is taken from regulations governing sales price of corn in Area 7, Holt County: "The maximum price for sales by producers of yellow corn to a farmer shall be 94 cents per bushel. The maximum price for sales by producers to any other person shall be 92 cents per bushel. The maximum price for sales of corn shall be the purchase price paid by the trucker, plus actual transportation costs incurred in the shipment, at rates not higher than the lowest applicable common carrier rates, plus 2 cents per bushel."

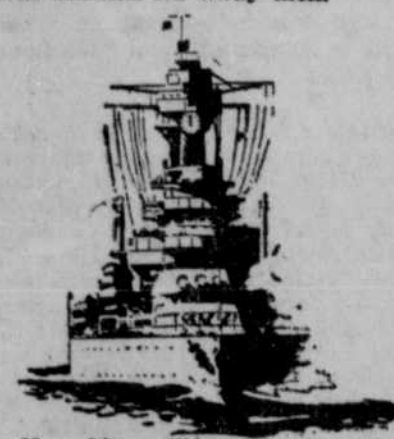

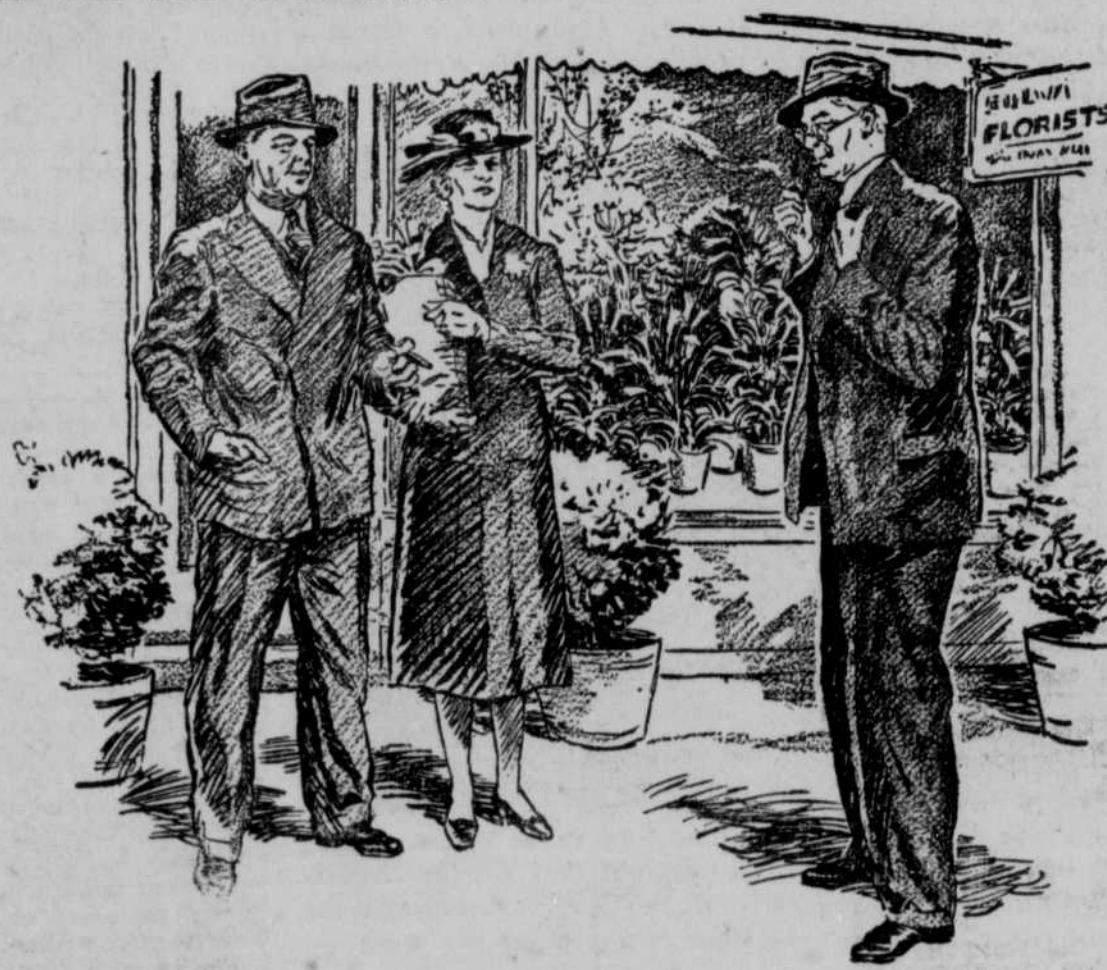
