Troops on the western front alone are firing more ammunition than is being produced and the demand from the forces of General Douglas MacArthur in the Philippines "is equally insistent," he asserted in an address prepared for the American Federation of Labor convention.

The production shortages, Somervell said, are because "we are ahead of our military timetable," with the rapid pace of advance in both Europe and the Pacific creating sharply increased demands.
