SWINE DISEASES APPEAR SIMILAR

As many a swine raiser knows from bitter experience, the symptons o. many common hog diseases closely resemble those of hog cholera, the worst hog-killer of all. If sickness appears in a herd. a few days' delay in finding out the true nature of the trouble may result in death of all of the animals, if the cause happens to be cholera. Once it has developed, cholera is almost 100 percent fatai although large doses of protective serum may save a percentage of the hogs if given in the early stages.
