Mr. and Mrs. Otto Matschullat It is estimated that mastisis or udder garget is costing dairy farmers \$100,000,000 yearly, and in some areas nearly 25% of dairy herds are affected by it.

A common cause of mastisis is a chain-like germ (Streptococcus agalactiae) which may lie hidden in the udders of cows for months, or even years. Then, suddenly, it multiplies rapidly and produces irreparable damage to the delicate lining membranes of the cow's udder

The disease may be either acute, with high fever and subsequent death, or a chronic, slow-going tissue change that ruins the cow's isefulness. Not all mastisis is caused by this particular "strep" germ. Sometimes serious outbreaks are due to "staph-type" germs—the variety responsible for boils
