Striking changes in American food habits have been developed during the period of World War II. Some of these are making an important contribution to national health.

One of the most important of these changes, states the National Dairy Council, is that of increased milk drinking. Per capita consumption of fluid milk and cream averaged 340 pounds in milk equivalent during the prewar period. According to preliminary government estimates that had risen to 442 pounds in 1945. In other words the average American formerly consumed the milk and cream from four ten-gallon cans each year and now requires the product from 5.2 ten-gallon cans, or an increase of 30 percent.
