The Nebraska Railway Commission will begin hearings Monday at Lincoln on applications from two air lines seeking to operate intrastate serv-Both lines plan to include ice. O'Neill on one of their routes.

A month ago the Prairie Airways, Inc., filed application with the commission to authorize an intrastate passenger and freight service.

On June 11 the Civil Aircraft Service, of Lincoln, filed application to carry mail and property over three routes. included Omaha, Route Wayne, Norfolk, O'Neill, Valentine, Gordon, Rushville, Chadron, Alliance, and Scottsbluff.
