BUS DEPOT TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Downey to Build 40 x 40-Foot Structure at Fifth and Douglas

DATE FIXED NO

A union bus depot for O'Neill was promised this week by an announcement that S. Downey plans to construct a 40 x 40 structure at the northwest corner of Fifth and Douglas streets, known as the Warner corner.

The announcement, however, did not indicate when actual construction operations would begin. It was pointed out that work would not be launched until practically all the necessary materials had been procured.

The building will be constructed with cement block and white finish. Chrome is intended to be used on the front, which will be modernistic in design

was confirmed by the state health department. The identity of the county's second victim was not im-mediately available to The

Frontier. The state's polio count is now 419, and the death toll stands at 31. Twelve new cases from 10 counties were reported during the past week. Knox county reported two.




