MOISTURE SLOWS CORNPICKING

Holt's Outlook Is Good; **Temperatures Drop to** 8- and 9-Degrees

PASTURES BENEFIT

While the Nation looks forward to the harvest of the largest corn crop on record, according to revised figures of the Department of Agriculture, the Holt county yield is expected to be generally good, but spotted.

The state-federal crop statisticians estimate Nebraska's corn crop will average 31 bushels per acre.

In Holt random reports range from "for feed only" to an iso-lated 70 bushels per acre. Many hybrid fields are averag-

ing in the neighborhood of 50 bushels per acre. A lack of rain-fall during the critical growing season prevented yields from being uniform.

Compicking operations have been retarded considerably because of the excessively wet Fall. The actual picking is not well un-derway because of this condition.

The abundance of Fall moismoisture, however, has been of great value to pastures and to next Spring's agricultural outlook


