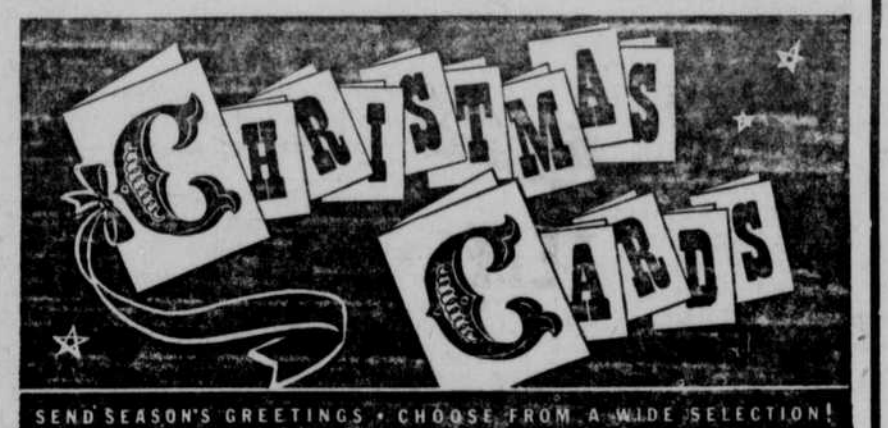
Rev. and Mrs. Clair McElheron and daughter, of Hartington, came Sunday to visit his brother, Rev. Lawrence McElheron.
