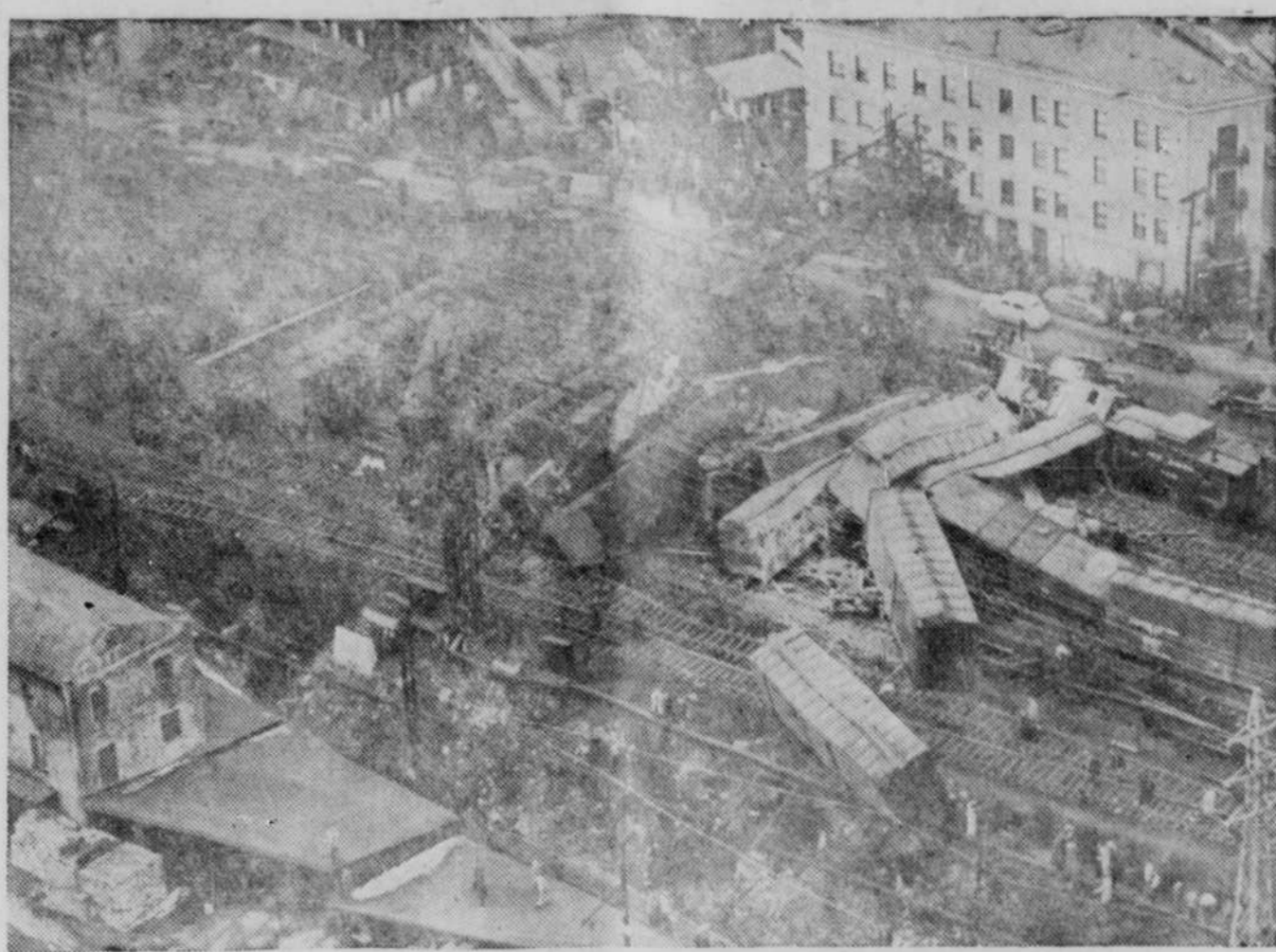

This was the verdict of the jury that tried Raymond Musser in the district court before Judge Kinkaid for the murder of George A. Spence. The case was hotly contested by the attorneys for both sides. M. F. and J. J. Harrington represented the defendant, while H. E. Murray and the county attorney prosecuted. A motion will be made for a new trial.
