PAGE-One of Holt county's few nonagenarians, Prince Thomas Stevens, died at 11:30 a. m. Wednesday at his home in Page. He had been a resident of Holt county since March, 1886. He passed his 90th birthday milestone in January.



\$20,000 ADDITION FOR BELL BUILDING

Work to Begin Soon on Expansion of **Phone Facilities**

The O'Neill telephone building will be enlarged substantially this year to house additional telephone equipment which is required to meet the greatly in-creased telephone needs of O'-Neill, it was announced by Mgr. Harry Petersen, of the North-western Bell Telephone compa-ny here. Work will be started this Spring on an addition to the rear of the present building, and it is expected that construction will be completed early next Fall. The cost of the expansion is given at \$20,000.

Since 1940, the number of telephones served by the O'Neill office has increased from 594 to 863, or 45 percent. The number of long distance calls is more than double the prewar average and is running about 16 per cent higher than a year ago, Mr. Petersen said.

Due to the increase in telephones and telephone calls, four additional switchboard positions will be added within a year, and the number of operators will be increased from 18 to about 30,
