**Mr. Tompkins Honored —**

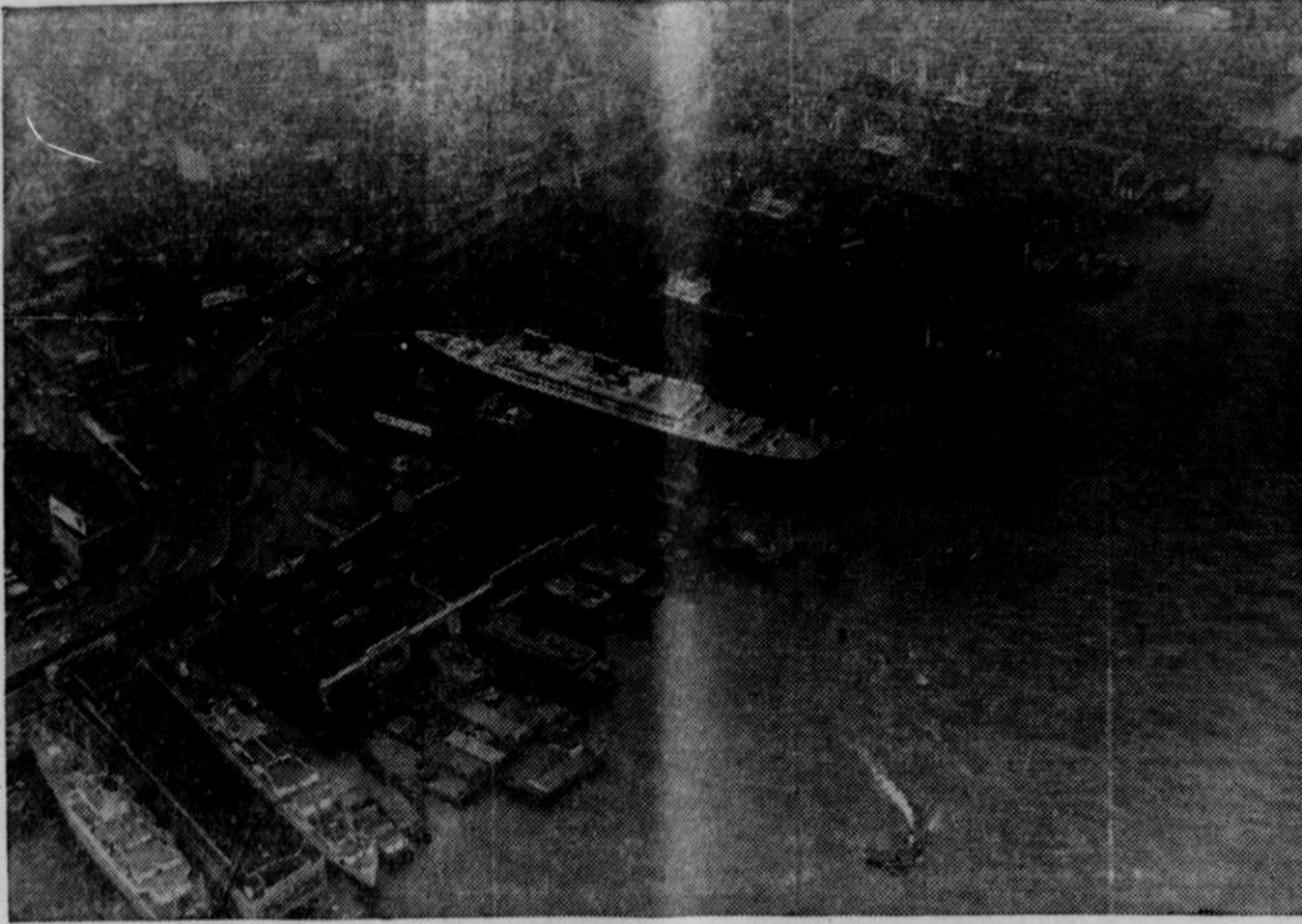
