We preach Christ and Him crucified!

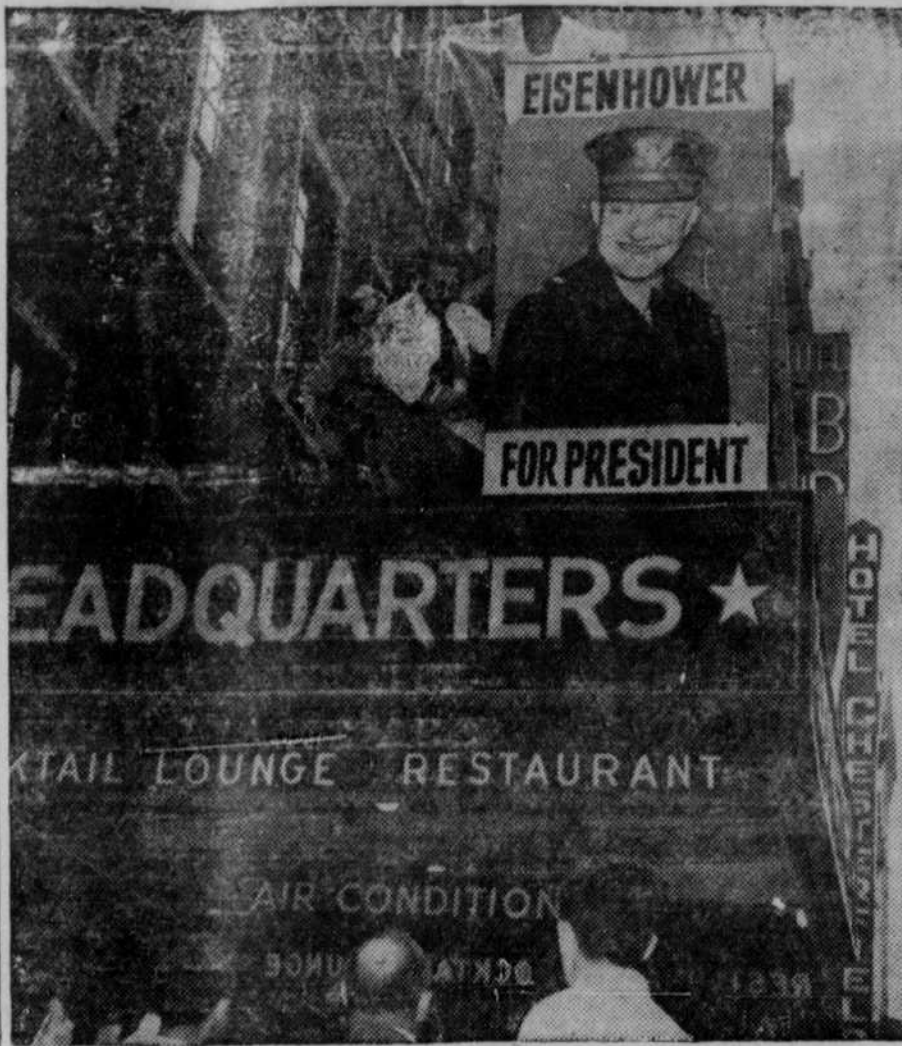
