THE ROCKETS' RED GLARE

Illustrating the barrage effect of rockets, this spectacular night sky pattern was made in an army ordnance department test. Nine 4.5-inch rockets, each packing the wallop of a large artillery

shell, were fired at half-second intervals from a lightweight launcher. Launcher is hidden by the glare of the firing, but a similar device, nicknamed "xylophone," can be seen in the foreground.

October 13, 1887

October 14, 1897
