## Mother of 4 Suffocates; Burns Fatal to Man

ATKINSON—Two persons are dead as the result of one of the worst tragedies in recent Atkinson history. The dead are:

Mrs. Thomas Slattery, 44, mother of 4. Edward L. Hamik, 48, gasoline and oil dealer.

An explosion in the Slattery residence about 9:10 a. m. Monday took the life of Mrs. Slattery, wife of an Atkinson merchant. Death is believed to have been caused by suffocation. Mr. Hamik escaped from the blazing house with his clothes afire. He was rushed to Our Lady of Lourdes hospital at Nor-

Mr. Hamik was delivering fuel oil to a barrel in the Slattery basement. It is believed that Mrs. Slattery turned on an electric light switch and a spark ignited the fumes. The explosion was heard throughout the north section of the

Mrs. William Morgan, a neighbor living a half-block away, was the first person to arrive at the scene. In helping tear burning clothes from Mr. Hamik's body her hands were burned—her right hand badly burned.
