## BOYS TOWN FOUNDER DIES

St. Patrick's Church Here Was First Parish for Father Flanagan

Rt. Rev. Edward J. Flana-gan, founder of Nebraska's famous Boys Town and a for mer assistant pastor of St. Patrick's Catholic church here, died in an Army hospital in Berlin, Germany, late Friday The 62-year-old priest, famed for his credo, "There is no such thing as a bad boy," was stricken with a heart attack.

Father Flanagan, who has championed the cause of underprivileged boys for over 3 decades, went to Vienna, Austria, in March to study Austrian youth conditions. During his tour he was received by Pope Pius XII.

Later he went to Germany at the invitation of the Army. In 1947 he made a similar mission to Japan.

Father Flanagan was born in Roscommon, Ireland. He had 11 brothers and sisters. He was educated in Ireland, the United States, and in Rome, where his health failed. He then went to Omaha

Father Flanagan gave sanctuary to boys accused of crimes ranging from petty thievery to murder. He pleaded in many courts for custody of youths-contending that environment was the most effective antidote for curbing juvenile delinquency.
