However, the Nebraska dates for hunting the pheasants is October 21-30, according to the game commission.

Bag limit was set at two roosters with possession limit the same. Shooting will start at 11 a. m., ending one hour before sundown.

The season for 1949 represents an 11-day reduction in hunting time as a 21-day seaton was in effect in 1948. Last year's bag limit and possession limit was three roosters.




