HOLT YOUTHS

Miss Whaley, Mr. Boyle
Return from 4-H
Club Congress

Miss Twila Whaley and Edward Boyle returned Saturday morning from Chicago, Ill., where they had attended the 28th national 4-H club congress in session November 27 through December 1.

Both were awarded all-expenses trip for outstanding work in their 4-H projects.

Edward Boyle was chosen state champion in his gardening project. His trip was awarded by the Allis Chalmers Co.

Miss Whaley was one of four national winners in her frozen foods project and was awarded the Chicago trip and a \$300 scholarship by the International Harvester Co.

Twenty-seven other delegates E. W. Janike, state 4-H leader, and four assistant leaders attended from Nebraska.

The week's schedule was packed with prominent speakers, educational tours under the guidance of tour majors, group discussions, group singing and banquets.

Among other interesting items on the program the group was entertained by Fred Waring and his orchestra and Jimmy Dorsey's band.

The Holt youths had the privilege of meeting "Miss America of 1949," Gene Autry, and the nation's top sport stars.

The entire club Congress delegates were guests of the International Livestock exposition on Wednesday, November 30. Completing the day's activities was the presentation of the 4-H club parade by all delegates and leaders.

During the week Twila and Edward visited the national barn dance, Chicago's Sunday evening hour, and The Breakfast Club.

The annual 4-H dinner in the Grand Ball Room of the Stevens hotel climaxed the weeks activity.

Miss Whaley told The Frontier she was particularly impressed with the view of Lake Michigan, and of the Mississippi river.

Delegates attended the congress from all 48 states, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Turkey, Sweden, Denmark and Finland.

Mr. Boyle wrote the following version:

"When I first learned that I was a state winner in a 4-H garden project and would be entitled to a trip to national 4-H Club congress, I accepted without hesitation but I was not greatly excited. Of course, I was thrilled at the prospect of going to the great city of Chicago when I had scarcely been on a train before in my life. Had I known what that the week would be like, I would have been very happy indeed!

"Like every normal American citizen, I suppose you have read stories about the threats of Communism to this great democracy of ours. I wish you could have seen the some 1,200 delegates at the nation 4-H club congress and to think that each was a champion in his own field. If you could have been in my place I am sure you would have agreed that if Communism is a threat to our democracy then 4-H is certainly a great force on the side of democracy. If everyone who has worried at the progress of Communism would turn about and do equal amount in living up to the slogan of the 4-H "Better Living for a Better World", Communism and its threat would be forever in the past.

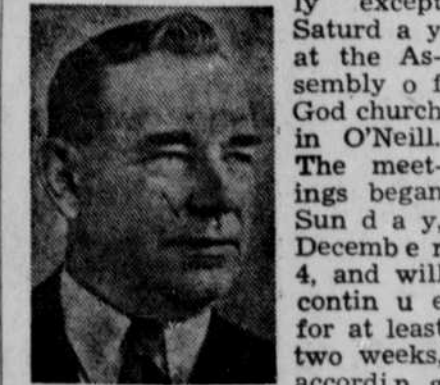

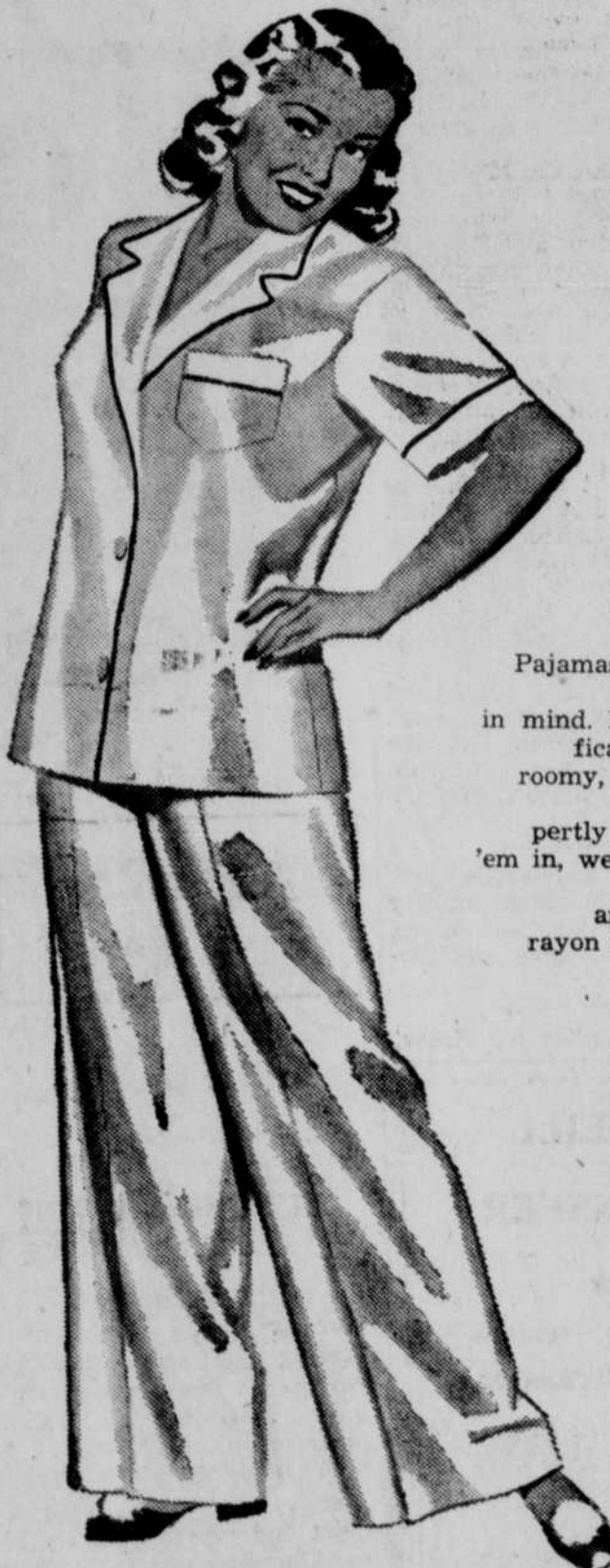
