STUART HOST AT
'GRASS DAYS'Seven Counties Will Be
Represented in All-
Day Meet

High school boys in Holt county and surrounding areas will have a chance to tell their elders "Why We Should Grow More Grass" and will win themselves cash prizes in addition.

The Stuart Community club is sponsoring an essay contest for high school boys in connection with Grassland-Livestock day to be held at Stuart on Tuesday, February 28.

Rules of the contest are as follows:

1. Subject: "Why We Should Grow More Grass."
2. Must be typewritten on one side of paper only.
3. Contestant must give name and school.
4. Essay must be from 300 to 1,000 words in length.
5. Contest is open to all high school boys in this area.
6. Entries must be submitted to A. Neil Dawes, county agent, O'Neill; C. R. Hill, soil conservationist, O'Neill; or direct to Henry Wolfe, extension agronomist, College of Agriculture, Lincoln by February 20, 1950.
7. Prizes are \$7.50; \$5.00 and \$2.50.
8. Winners will be announced at Grass Days program.

At that time men from the extension service, U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Production Marketing association, and other government agencies will be on hand to explain why we need to consider growing more grass, grass utilization and management. It will be an all-day program.

A panel discussion by farmers

and ranchers from this area with interesting experiences & stories will constitute a part of the afternoon program. Antelope, Holt, Boyd, Keya Paha, Rock, Brown and Cherry counties are included in the area to be represented at the meeting.

Door prizes of grass seed will be given by the Holt soil conservation district and Stuart community club. Winners must be present to win.

Identification of grasses both forage and seed will furnish interesting contest material with prizes to the top three winners of ranger alfalfa seed donated by Production Credit Association of O'Neill.

The meeting will begin at 9:30 a.m. with the Holt soil conservation district's annual meeting until 10:15, then continuing with interesting talks by prominent agricultural leaders such as K. C. Fouts, D. L. Gross, Henry Wolfe and O. J. McDougal, of the Extension Service; Laird Wolfe and L. F. Bredemeier, of the soil conservation service, and Harry Ressel, of Production Marketing association. Meeting will conclude with a panel discussion from 2:45 p.m. to 3:45 p.m.
