Six hundred hogs and 380 head of cattle were sold at the Thursday, April 6, sale at the O'Neill Livestock market here. The market was steady with the prices at the March 30 sale. Top butchers weighing 200 to 240 pounds cleared from \$15.85 to \$16.15; 240 to 270 pound butchers brought \$15.50 while the heavier butchers sold on down to \$15. Sows cleared from \$13.75 to \$14. Good quality calves and yearlings were steady with the March 30 sale. Steer calves sold from \$25 to \$28 and heifer calves brought \$23 to \$25. Cows hit \$14.50 to \$17.

Members Use Horse, Wagons, Tractors to Attend Meet—

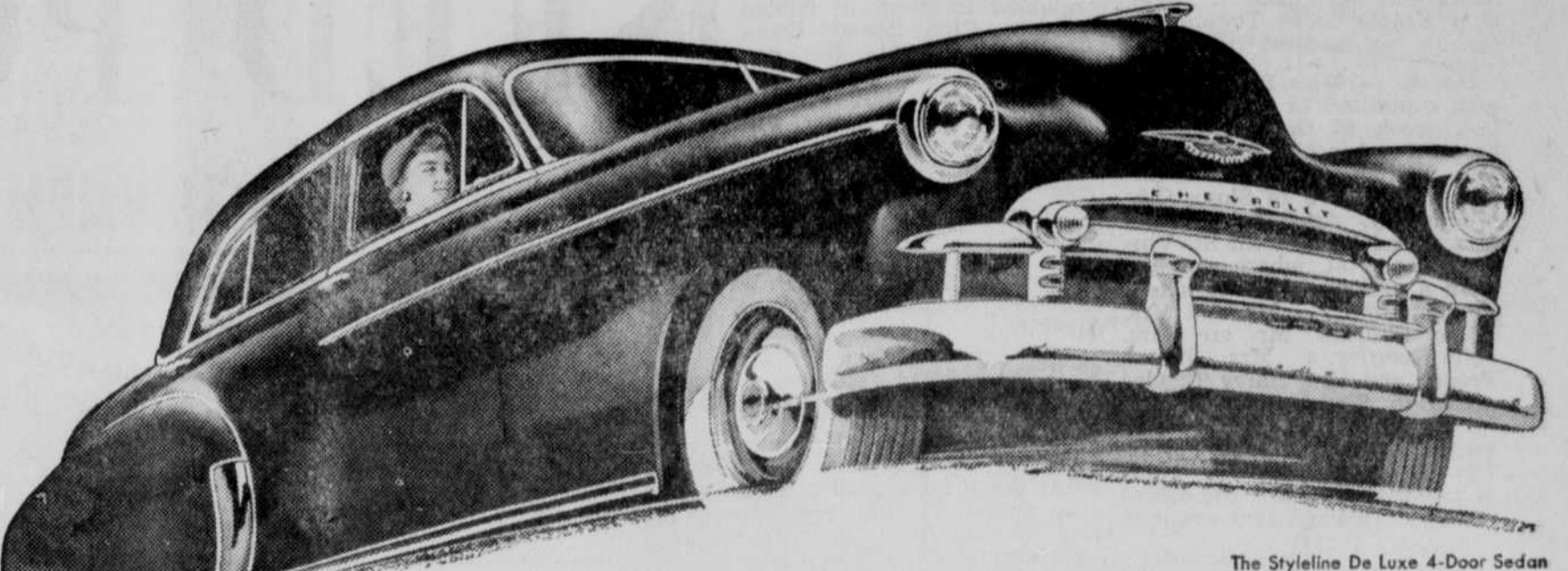
