Omahan Pulls Sleeper Play in Filing For Attorney - General's Position

LINCOLN — Whether an Democrat: J. C. McReynolds, Omaha Democrat named Har- Lincoln; J. C. Schlater, Oshold P. Caldwell had pulled off kosh; Lou Maupin, Lincoln. the year's biggest political surprise was being debated at the capital this week.

Caldwell walked into the sec- folk (X). retary of state's office a few rninutes before the 5 p. m. fil-ing Thursday, June 29, and Co submitted his application for the regular nomination at attorney - general, and also for the short term.

He maintained that the law allows Attorney-General C. S. Beck, who succeeded James H. Anderson, to hold the office only "until the next election."

Since Caldwell was the only one to file for the short term, he reasoned he should automatically get the office from the time the election is certified (sometime in November) until January, when officials elected in the general balloting take office.

Petitions may be circulated for a candidate up until 60 days before the election, so it's conceivable there may be others in the short term race.

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
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
