The silk hangs from the husks of developing ears of corn. The white and pink and deeper tints of the hollyhock in full bloom lend their charm from flower gardens. The verdure of the fields, the green of the pastures and the color and fragrance of floral bloom along the pathways of men. The rolling thunder and raging storms in mid-summer, the rainbow hues when the earth has been washed and clouds drained of water. Green balls cling to the

branches of walnut trees, berries and fruits in orchards, the summer carpet at our feet and weeds and bushes by the roadside.

Alexander Pope forged a verse that unveils a mood of the poet in a tribute to the gifts of nature:

"For me kind Nature wakes her genial power, Suckles each herb and spreads out every flower; Annual for me the grape, the rose renew The juice nectarous, and the balmy dew; For me the mine a thousand treasures brings; For me health gushes from a thousand springs; Seas roll to waft me, suns to lull me, rise; My footstool earth, my canopy the skies."

Nebraska does not rank among the densely populated states, but has a thrifty, contented people numbering in the sum total no more than the masses gathered in one of the large cities of the country.

In some of these densely populated communities are slum conditions and wretched human haunts unknown on prairie land. Others may glory over the numbers they count within their realms, Nebraskans look out across an uncrowded, farflung landscape fenced with the blue and green of the distant horizon.

On the Statue of Liberty in New York harbor is an inscription of countrywide significance in which prairie land patriots feel they join. It reads:

Give me your tired, your poor, Your huddled masses yearning to be free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed, to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door.
