There was a fair turnout of voters in Holt county for the primary elections Tuesday despite the fact that ranchers were working desperately to make up time lost earlier this summer through bad weather and many of them did not take time out to go to the polls. Also, a bad storm late in the day undoubtely kept many voters away from the polls.
