Over a thousand miles of maintenance gravel resurfac-

The work will be divided into 62 units and will be carried on in 42 counties of the state. Nearly 135 thousand cubic yards of gravel, weigh-in about 362 million pounds, will be placed on these highways.

Since almost all of the gravel will come from Nebraska rivers and streams, most of the material will be trucked to the sites where it will be used. Nearly 27 thousand trucks, each carrying 6% tons, would be required to move all the gravel at once. Parked bumper - to - bumper, these trucks would form a cavavan over a hundred miles long.

Some of the gravel will be Some of the gravel will be moved across Nebraska in rail-roads gondola cars. Most of these cars carry 40 cubic yards of gravel and are about 42 feet of gravel and are about 42 feet long. A train nearly 27 miles long would be needed to transport all the gravel to be used on the maintenance projects in the August 24 letting.




