Establish Tree Mrd. and Mrs. Vern Sageser Plantings Again-

The state game and wildlife commission will again establish tree plantings for wildlife

Last year similar plantings were established on the following places: Ryan Estate, L. W. Reimer, and T. F. Matthews, all of O'Neill, and Theo. Baumeister, of Atkinson. These areas have a good survival this year. A card from the Travers famaccording to C. R. ("Bob") Hill, of the Holt soil conservation service. Cedar, Russian Olive, and a variety of other fruiting shrubs were planted. The areas

range from 1 to 3 acres. The game commission furnished the fence and trees and will plant and cultivate the trees the first year. The cooperator agrees to maintain the fence and do the necessary cultivation for the next 10 years. These areas are not posted nor are they game reserves. They are merely areas designed to afford protection or cover particularly for pheasants. The individual land owner may or may not allow hunting just as he choses.

To qualify these areas must be within 1/2 mile of cropland and over 1/2 mile from the woody cover. Any Holt soil conesrva-tion district cooperator desiring such an erea shauld contact the U.S. soil conservation at O'Neill before September 1. Only a limited number of areas be established.
