JOHN G. BOOTH, 73, BURIED SATURDAY

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m., Saturday, August 5, for John G. Booth, 73, who died Thursday, August 3, at the home of his son, Clarence, in O'Neill. Rites were held at the Jessen Funeral home in Ainsworth with Rev. V. R. Bell officiating. Burial was at Ainsworth.

Mr. Booth died of coronary sclerosis after an illness of about 30 days. He was a retired farmer who had been employed the past 4 years as custodian at St. Mary's academy, in O'Neill.

Mr. Booth was the father of 4 children, all of whom survive. They are Mrs. Beryl Willcuts, of Cabool, Mo.; Clarence, of O'Neill; Harley, of O'Neill, and Mrs. Bernice Carr, of Casper, Wyo.

He has 2 surviving brothers: Roy, who lives in the state of Washington; and Charles, who lives in California. There are 11 grandchildren, and 4 great-grandchildren.

Mr. Booth's wife, the former Anna Ewing, of Waco, Nebr., preceded him in death in 1929.

John G. Booth was born January 27, 1877, at Fertile, Ia., but in early youth came to Nebraska with his parents, who settled in Keya Paha county. He married the former Anna Ewing, of Waco, Nebr., in 1904.

After her death in 1929 he moved to Idaho, where he lived until 1936. He made his home in Ainsworth until 1945, when he moved to O'Neill, where he spent the rest of his life.
