Few Surprises in State Primaries

On the state front the voters came through Tuesday just about as predicted. Val Peterson jumped into an early lead for the gubernatorial nomination and was never headed. That he was to be the GOP choice for a third term nomination was never in doubt after the early returns began coming in.

What little excitement was provided in the opening round of battle for the governor's chair was provided by the Democrats. Walter R. Raecke was still leading in the late stages of the ballot counting with Terry Carpenter, of Scottsbluff, apparently having an outside chance of pulling an upset. Frank Morrison, McCook; Harry R. Swanson, Omaha; and Henry L. Fillman, York; also ran.

In the 4th district congressional race it looked like no contest with Miller, the incumbent, piling up a lead that approached 4 to 1 with only half of the precincts accounted for.
