We talked with a guy over there and he said they found 7 Americans with their hands tied behind their backs and shot in their faces. "We got a dispatch from the chief of naval operations giving us a 'Well done' on our sweeping at Geulstoa Wan Korea." His ship is a mine sweeper.
