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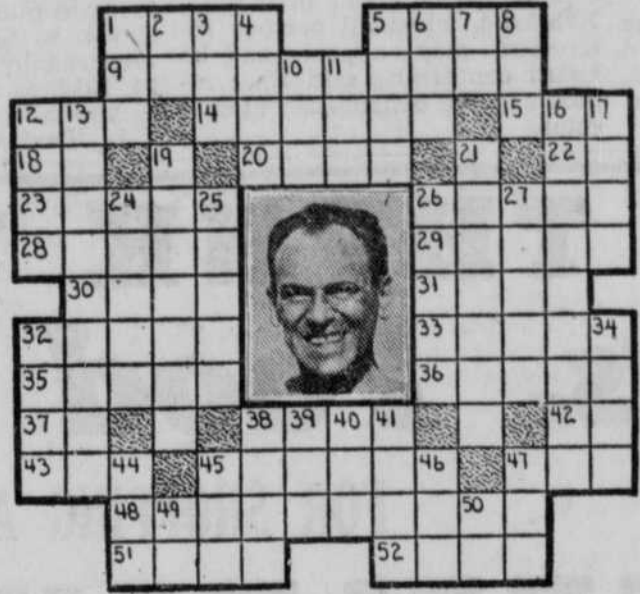

Port's Building Fund Increased

STUART—The Stuart-Atkinson airport board met with a representative engineer on Saturday, September 30, to finish negotiations with state and federal aeronautics authorities for a 12-thousand-dollar airport administration building. The proposed building will be 24x40 feet and will be constructed of steel.

Three thousand dollars will be put up by the village of Stuart in cooperation with the city of art's share will come from a tax levy which has been in effect for several years. A federal grant-in-aid fund will add \$6,000 and the state has already approved aid amounting to \$3,000.

The state aeronautics commission increased its allocation for the proposed Stuart-Atkinson port in a meeting Saturday, after which a representative hurried to confer with the Holt people. The papers had to be signed during September.
