The gasoline tax referendum issue results were: "yes", 2,225; "no" 2,697; license issue, "yes", 2,112; "no", 2,461.

Holt countyans endorsed Governor Peterson but supported his road program to a lesser de-gree. In fact, substantially few-er ballots were cast on the gas tax and license issues, suggesting that folks did not wholly understand.


