Notice to Taxpayers

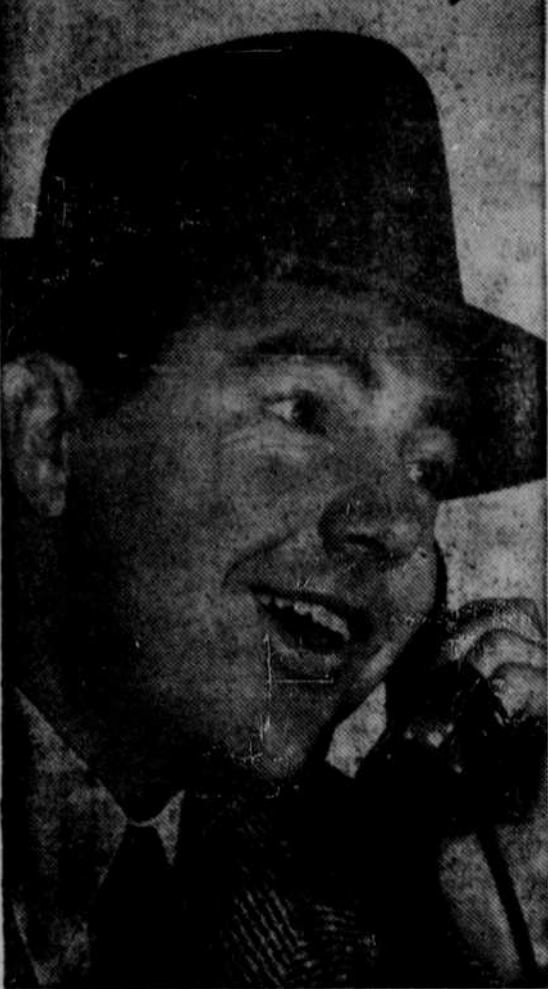
Assessment starts March 10th, 1951, and continues to April 20. It is the duty of each taxpayer to see that their schedule is made out and returned to the county assessor.

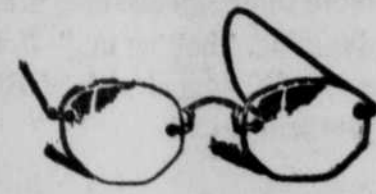
