

Josies Jinx for Hartington High

ATKINSON—St. Joseph's hall, of Atkinson, has earned another ticket to the state class C basketball tournament.

The Josies turned back Hartington high Wildcats, 54-38, Friday night at Wausa in a district class C playoff.

The Josies have turned out to be a genuine jinx to Hartington. They have now defeated the Wildcats three times in regional playoffs, the other times being in 1947 and 1950.

Friday night's tilt was a real battle for three quarters, but Hartington faded in the final quarter. A burst of 12 points by Schauf, of St. Joe, in the last quarter didn't do Hartington any good, either. Schauf totaled 25 points, and Tutshla added 10 for the Josies. Whitney led Hartington with 14 points and Mitchell added 7.

Officials were Verle Huntsman, of Walthill, and Leo Tomjak, of O'Neill.

St. Joe normally is a class D school by virtue of high school enrollment, but this year, as in recent years, the Jays have elected to compete in class C.

Play became hectic in the second half with both teams going ahead intermittently, only to be overtaken by the other. With two minutes remaining in the game the score was 39-37, Ainsworth leading. With eight seconds to play, Don Calkins, Eagle guard, drove through for a set-up that was missed that would have meant victory for O'Neill. Gary Buckmaster, Eagle forward, was fouled while going after the rebound but he couldn't connect on a free throw with two seconds to play. A sink would have put the contest into an extra period.

Carl Johnson, Ainsworth center, pushed in 18 points to lead the Bulldog scoring and lofty Ted Lindberg, O'Neill center, hit for 20 points in the defeat.

Official Jim Corwell, of Stanton, had trouble getting the ball game stopped to give Buckmaster the gratis try. George Kilcoin, O'Neill forward, dumped in an illegal jump shot under the basket, but Corwell ordered the game resumed with Buckmaster's free throw.
