Spaghetti With White Clam Sauce (four servings) Two tablespoons chopped fresh parsley, 1 chopped clove garlic,

1 chopped onion, 1/4 cup olive oil, 11/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, I large can minced clams, I package thin spaghetti. Brown parsley, onion and garlic in hot olive oil until ingredients are cooked. Season with salt and pepper. Add clams and simmer for about 5 minutes. Don't overcook or clams will become hard. 


