

**F. C. STANTON, 79,
BURIAL AT EWING**

EWING—Funeral services for Fred Clinton Stanton, 79, were held Thursday, June 24, at the Methodist church in Ewing with Rev. C. C. Chappell in charge.

Mr. Stanton died in a Marysville, Calif., hospital on Saturday, June 16.

Born in Clinton, Ia., on November 9, 1871, as a boy he moved with his parents onto a homestead north of O'Neill in Holt county.

It was here he was united in marriage to Miss Ada Almina McAllister on December 27, 1894. They resided on a farm near Mincola for a few years, later moving to Ewing, where they spent the remainder of their married life.

To this union were born 8 children, 7 of whom survive. A son, John Woodrow, died at the age of 2. His wife preceded him in death on April 22, 1931, at Ewing.

After the death of his wife, he made Ewing his home for a time, later moving to Yuba City, Calif., to be near his 3 daughters and 2 sons who live there.

Survivors include: Sons—William C. Stanton, of Herrick, S.D.; Harry M. Stanton and James A. Stanton, both of Yuba City, Calif.; daughters—Mrs. Letha Craig, of San Francisco, Calif.; Mrs. Edna Kowalchick, Mrs. Lois Bartlett and Mrs. Sara Tressler, all of Yuba City; sister—Mrs. Earl Smith, of Inman; 22 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Verna Anson and Mrs. Harriet Welke sang a duet, "Abide With Me," and Mrs. William Stanton, jr., sang "A Better Land," with Mrs. C. C. Chappell at the piano.
