

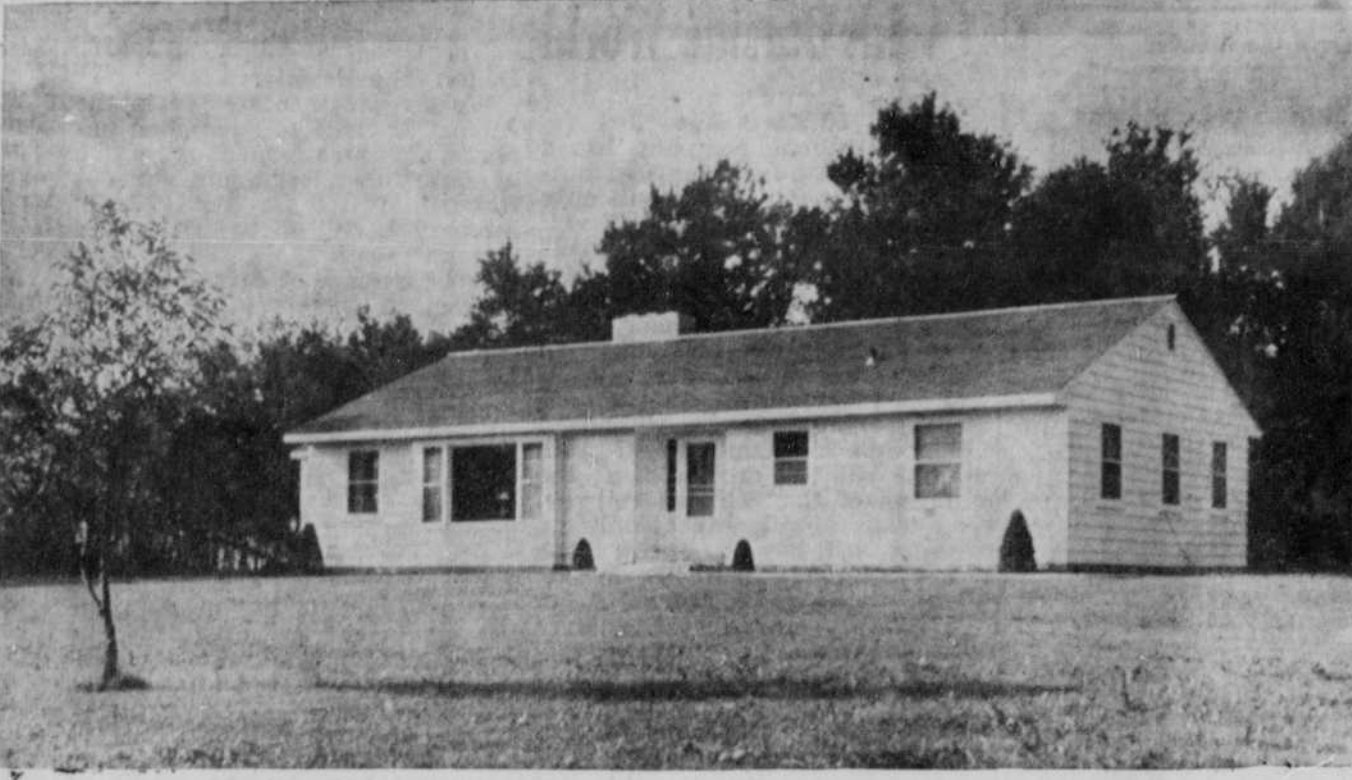

Dr. Devine Rites Held at Cheyenne

Dr. John A. Devine, 65, a prominent Cheyenne, Wyo., dentist for the past 40 years, died on September 1 at Memorial hospital in Cheyenne, Wyo., after an extended illness.

Doctor Devine was born in Steator, Ill., and received his secondary education there. He was graduated from the Creighton school of dentistry in 1909 and practiced in O'Neill before moving to Cheyenne.

He was one of the original members of the Wyoming State Dental society formed 35 years ago. He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus, fourth degree; the Fraternal Order of Eagles, and was an honorary lifetime member of the Elks lodge.

Besides his wife, the former Mae Campbell, of O'Neill, Doctor Devine is survived by 4 children — Frank, of Oconto; Mrs. Betty Ankney, of Cody, Wyo.; and Jane and Joe Devine, both of Cheyenne. He is also survived by 4 brothers and 1 sister.

He was preceded in death by 2 sons, John and Jim.

Funeral services were held on Tuesday, September 4, at St. Mary's church in Cheyenne and burial was in Olivet cemetery with Rev. James A. Hartmann officiating.
