> I am sending along my recipe for pineapple sponge cake.

PINEAPPLE SPONGE CAKE Two cups sifted cake flour, 4 eggs, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 11/2 cups sugar, 1 cup pineapple juice, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla, confectioners sugar glaze, 1/2 cup crushed pineapple, well drained.

Sift flour once, measure and sift again. Beat eggs and salt to-gether until thick and light colored. Then add sugar gradually, beating constantly. Add 1½ cups of flour alternately with the hot pineapple juice, beating well after each addition. Combine remaining flour and baking powder and sift over batter. Beat in thoroughly. Add vanilla, blend. Turn batter into ungreased 9-inch tube pan. Bake in moderate oven of 375 F. 40 minutes or until done. Remove from oven.

Invert pan and let stand 1 hour or until cake is cool. FROSTING FOR PINEAPPLE

SPONGE CAKE Make confectioners sugar glaze by combining 1 cup sifted confectioners sugar with 1 table-spoon water. Spread on top of relatives in Minnesota. cake and let dribble down the sides. Garnish top of cake with a ring of the crushed pineapple. pineapple. To make topping, whip cup heavy cream until cream will hold its shape. Sweeten to taste, then fold in ½ cup drained, canned crushed pineapple. Spread on top and sides of cake or use as a sauce on slices of cake. One No. 2 can crushed pineapple will give sufficient juice and drained pipeapple for this cake.




